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Principal's report

Can you believe we are nearly half way through the year? What a great term we are having at SEWS.

As you all know I love to get into the classrooms as often as I can to spend time with our students and staff as they work together each day to achieve their personal best. I am always so impressed with the innovative and engaging programs on offer. I just watched a wonderful Tacpac lesson with a mixed aged group this morning. How lucky we are to enjoy such a variety of interactive opportunities at SEWS. With the addition of Seesaw to our school communication platforms I am thoroughly enjoying the additional way of seeing all the exciting learning opportunities on offer every day at school. It is wonderful to share these moments and welcome families into our school every day through Seesaw. A big thank you to Charlotte for continuing to support the implementation and introduction of this great communication tool.

At the beginning of Term 2 I asked staff and students for their wish list suggestions. One that was long overdue and easily solved was to implement a trial 'pop-up' canteen initially selling a limited range of items for purchase. The first canteen 'pop-up' will be held in Week 10, supported by the students in Class 3 – information will be sent home shortly. Watch this space!

Recently I received the exciting news that SEWS has been targeted to support other schools to embed Aboriginal perspectives into learning activities and programs for high support needs students. We have been identified by the Department of Education (DoE) Aboriginal Education Advisors as a leader in this area thanks to the hard work of our Aboriginal Education team led by Doug Watt. We are now supporting another SSP with this journey by sharing the expertise and enthusiasm Doug brings to this project.

The school is currently in the process of migrating from a privately run school website to a DoE website. Sarah Madden has been working closely with the DoE website team to make this happen. The new website is <u>https://sirericwoo-s.schools.nsw.gov.au/</u> we think you will find it easy to navigate and full of important information about SEWS and the DoE.

The school has been informed that we will receive a new roof as part of the DoE assets maintenance program during 2019. This work will occur in stages with the vast majority of the work occurring during school holiday periods to ensure minimal disruption. Additionally, we are expecting the work on the new covered outdoor learning area (COLA) to commence in the July school holidays. This will be such a great addition to our outdoor learning space.

Student reports are in the final phases of editing and will be sent home in the last week of term. I hope you enjoy reading about your child's progress as much as I have. I am always excited to read about the learning goals that have been achieved by everyone at SEWS.

Finally, I would like to wish everyone a safe and restful school holiday break. I look forward to seeing you all back at school in Term 3.

Seesaw: sharing my learning fun!

Seesaw, the learning journal app, is now up and running for F2F students. It's proving to be a real hit with students and parents alike.

Seesaw is like Facebook but for student's work. Students can upload their schoolwork in photos, videos and presentations so parents at home or work can see in real time what is happening at school. Students, teachers, parents and carers can then comment and 'heart' their child's work giving the student great feedback and encouragement.

Most pleasing has been the rich conversations between teachers and families about the student's program. Teachers are learning more about their student's activities at home, eg Quinn's bedtime story choices, Jo learned that Quinn when given a choice of two stories will always pick both! Smart cookie! Then Daniel's family got to see a great shoulder stretch to try at home as demonstrated in a video with Jodie our school physiotherapist.

I can see from the number of items uploaded, the number of likes and comments and parent logins that Seesaw is really making a huge difference in the classroom and at home. Next we will start using Seesaw to complete exciting activities in morning circle time. Watch out for exciting updates to come.

It's a goal! In response to Acting Principal Sian's invitation to students to express a wish list for their school, everyone made a written submission. Here is Thomas' persuasive appeal:

'Playgrounds should have soccer goals. Soccer goals will stop the ball. All people will love it. It will improve my goalie skills. People will feel happy. Students in wheelchairs will be safe. Our school will be great.'

We were all delighted when Sian said 'yes!'. Various options were compared. The students measured the playgrounds and estimated the impact different goals would make on the play space. When the new goals arrived the students were very keen to test them out and give a big tick of approval. Thank you Sian for our new goals!

In science, Class 3 has been investigating forces, including gravity and magnetic forces. They have been moving things around using the repelling action of the magnets and having lots of fun!

Last week we listened to a series of stories told by Aboriginal Elders. The students enjoyed watching the images on screen as they listened to the stories. Their responses show their understanding:

'The baby boy lived in a Coolabah tree with some dingoes. The boy was teasing the dingoes and they didn't like it. After a while the dingo puppies grew up and went away. The tree said to him, "You need to find food". So he found lizards and a kangaroo. He saw the dingos but he didn't share with them. They were angry and they killed him.' - Ethan

'The seven sisters tells us how the stars got in the sky. The tricky old man turned into a moon so he could see the sisters. Then he changed into a snake and made thunder and rain. The sisters ran to the top of a hill and jumped up so high that they turned into stars. We can still see them in the sky.' - Sam

It was great fun playing these games!

We have been doing so well that we have also started swimming together as a 'team' in an attempt to beat the clock, which at the moment shows us completing a lap in 16 seconds.
