#### Ziggy's news

#### **Premier's Reading Challenge 2021**

Our school is participating in the **Premier's Reading Challenge** this year.

The Challenge aims to encourage a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in students, and to enable them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition but a challenge to each student to read, to read more and to read more widely.

It is open to all students K – 10 this year.

The challenge starts on the 1st of March and finishes on the 20th of August.

Students can participate by independently reading the books, shared reading or having the books read to them.

Years 3 – 10 must read at least 20 books, including at least 15 books from the PRC book list and up to 5 personal choice books.

Years K – 2 must read at least 30 books, including at least 25 books from the PRC book list and up to 5 personal choice books.

Students may read or listen to books from any list K - 10.

#### Step 3: Sign in with your school email address and password

#### Step 4: Browse the Explore tab and borrow a book

- Your book will open so you can start reading or listening right away.
- If all copies of the book you wish to borrow are checked out, you can place a
  hold on the book. This will put you on the waitlist. Once a copy of the book
  gets returned, it will become available for the first person on the waitlist. You
  will be sent a notification in Sora when the book is available for you to borrow.
- Books are automatically returned on their due date.



#### Step 5: Go to your Shelf to see all your books

- Tap Open Book or Open Audiobook to read or listen to the book where you left off.
- Tap Options to renew or return a book early.



It was inspiring to see how hard the tiny chicks worked to break out of their eggs. Everyone learnt about the needs of chicks and we were amazed at how quickly they grew. A huge level of self-control and care was shown when they gently held a chick to closely observe its features. We were very proud of the concerns expressed by all students when they observed the smallest chick, who happened to be the only dark one, being bullied by the others. This provided an opportunity for discussion on difference, inclusion and belonging. Strategies were suggested for both chicks and children who experience feelings of isolation or bullying, and those who observe it. We have a very kind, considerate group of young students in Class 3.

When the weather allowed us to go out, we practised fundamental movement skills, with a focus on balance, hopping, skipping, catching and kicking. We also loved dancing and making patterns with our bodies! It's hard to believe Term One is almost over. Have a healthy, happy and relaxing holiday break everyone, and we'll be looking forward to an awesome Term Two!

Izack created a beautiful watercolour painting for his aunty. I look forward to more fantastic artworks from Izack in the terms ahead.


Class 11 will welcome a new student in Term 2. I look forward to working with this student and his family and reporting on his achievements throughout the year.



All of these students had never been into a shop by themselves. With individual training they were taught how to choose items, cope with other people in noisy environments, queue up appropriately, and purchase goods using cash and card. Road crossing followed. Each student could then cross roads to access shops. Some students continued on to learn bus, train and metro travel. Stranger awareness skills were also introduced. Importantly, these were also tested in real life situations where

they were approached by a 'stranger' on the bus, metro or train platform.

Students that learnt these essential skills from Year 7 in 1:1 training sessions easily transitioned from school to work, study and leisure activities. They developed self-confidence, resilience and the knowledge to travel safely and independently.
